As the country slowly wends its way back towards normal (whatever that is these days), CAMRA Durham has been doing its best to keep people informed about the situation with our pubs, clubs, and breweries, all the while encouraging people to use those pubs and clubs, and to try real ale if they're not already doing so.

Conversations with licensees have revealed that in certain sectors those returning to pubs are doing so while going for "non-real" beers, with the cask side of things being slower to recover. Whether this is a by-product of drinkers getting used to certain products that were available to them during lockdown, which in many cases didn't involve real ale, is open to debate. However, one things that is definite is that pubs and clubs were closed for a long time and this had an effect on people's drinking habits. Bottles and cans became the norm for many, and the social aspect of visiting the local disappeared for some. The buzz-words of "mental health" have been on everyone's lips, and even the most cynical of us will have realised that this is a very real problem which has grown as a result of the pandemic. As a friend of mine said recently when asked why he'd started going down the pub of a Sunday afternoon, "for a bit of man-chat." That can obviously be applied to both genders, as it just means getting together with friends over a few drinks and putting the world to rights. Getting it off your chest rather than shouting at the television, sharing everything from the silly jokes to the serious debates of the day. CAMRA Durham recognises the vital role pubs play in our community, and continue discourse with local MPs and councils, sending them a monthly newsletter pressing for their intervention on various matters that affect pubs and brewers. Several points have been raised in parliament as a direct result of our work with MPs, so big thanks are due to them for responding.

As CAMRA has recently celebrated its golden anniversary, various celebratory awards ere made, and we in Durham must congratulate long-standing member and former chairman (amongst various other roles) **Peter Lawson** on his Golden Award for his outstanding contribution over the years. Well done Peter.

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Pub and brewery news

- The Black Bull in Wolsingham has reopened, with a real ale voted for by the customers.
- The Queens Head in Shildon has closed and reopened since our last issue. No real ale yet, but perhaps they'll join Elm Road Club, the Railway Institute, the Three Tuns, and the Bar & Kitchen on the Shildon Ale Trail.
- Caps Off brewery has taken over the site formerly occupied by the Bishop Auckland Brewery, which is no longer in operation, giving more space for expansion of cask production.
- No real ale at the Coal Face, Seaham (not to be confused with the Coal House)
- The Moorings at Hett Hills has changed hands and removed the real ale
- The Happy Wanderer in Framwellgate has reopened as The Gate, with handpumps in place—if you get the chance to visit, please let us know what you find.
- The Half Moon in Kirk Merrington has reopened and is trying cask ale, with Black Sheep and Yard of Ale being featured.
- The Chester Moor was due to reopened in February
- The saga of the sale or otherwise of the Smiths Arms at Castle Dene near
 Chester le Street rumbles on, with the owner, who want to convert to residential use, and the Save the Smiths group working to move forward on the situation. The pub remains closed for the foreseeable future.
- The Durham sausage company has opened an outlet in Durham with keg taps from Hops & Dots and McColl's.
- The Brawn's Den at Brandon has new management
- The former Black Horse at Brandon is now the Pub and Kitchen, but with no real ale.
- No real ale at the Moors Tavern, Spennymoor after reopening



Thanks to all who voted, as it's your opinions and comments that make these pubs and clubs winners and runners up. If you think your local is worth an award, then watch out for next year's competition and make your feelings known with your votes.

Watch out for how CAMRA Durham's pubs and clubs fare in the regional, and hopefully national, competition -again, we'll keep you posted. We've had regional winners in the past, with the Grey Horse, Consett, the Surtees Arms at Ferryhill Station, and Durham City's Victoria Inn among our pubs that have gone on to "greater" things. Even being nominated beyond our Durham area means positive publicity for our venues, so make your vote count when you get the chance.

The "Goth" and the Gothenburg system

Lying about eight miles east of Edinburgh is the small town of Prestonpans, nestling on the coast north of the A1. It is well blessed with places of interest, such as an industrial museum, a famous battle site (in 1745- Bonny prince Char-



lie's highland army defeated a government army) and a nationally important heritage pub, the Prestoungrange Gothenburg. Known locally as the Goth, it lies facing the sea on the High street, with excellent views over the Firth of Forth to the kingdom of Fife.



It has its own brewery and is part of a much bigger history, which we will visit later. Built in 1908 in Arts and Crafts style, the public bar is magnificent, featuring low segmented arches, wall panelling and rich green Art Nouveau tiling. The central bar was an island bar with a tiny jug bar joining it next to the front door. To the left is an ele-

gantly panelled lounge which functions as a dining room, and in an extension to the rear is the brewery.

The beer is brewed by the Faking Bad brewery ,set up, as one would expect from the name, by two chemistry teachers. They brew two beers: Sub Atomic, a light fruity APA 5.2%, and Proton Porter, a warm dark 5.7% beer subtly spiced

with ginger. The beers are available as mini kegs as off sales. I don't know if they supply any other pubs.

But the real story is The Gothenburg System, originating in the Swedish city of that name. In the midnineteenth century spirits were widely distilled in



homes in Sweden, producing a major health and economic challenge to the nation. In 1865 this was outlawed and one provider was given a monopoly, but any profit was limited to 5% with the rest being returned to the community, controlled by town council, and used to build schools, hospitals, parks etc. The idea was picked up by coal merchants who exported Scottish coal to Gothenburg.

Then in 1893 the Industrial and Provident Societies Act allowed a similar system to be adopted in Scotland. Local coal companies set up these pubs almost entirely in the Scottish coalfields, and by 1914 there were more than 20 in Fife. The pubs were initially designed to be unwelcoming and austere to discourage drinking, gambling, and spirits. and any games (including dominos) were banned, while no credit was allowed. The system funded libraries, bowling greens, museums, parks, and cinemas.



Throughout Scotland several Gothenburg pubs remain but only three operate under the old system where profits are returned to the community. The Goth in Prestonpans is far from austere but still operates under the old system, serving three real ales at any one time, making it well worth a visit. Whatpub describes it as a *superb Gothenburg pub listed on*

CAMRA's National Pub Inventory with a magnificent painted ceiling in the bar.

The in-house microbrewery that can be viewed from the bar is now used by Faking Bad Brewery (https://

www.fakingbadbrewery.co.uk) to produce the inhouse real ales. There is an upstairs lounge and function room with superb views over the Forth. The walls throughout are covered in murals and paintings depicting past local life. Meals are served all day and include gluten free options.



The Strangers' Bar

Fans of *Only Fools and Horses* will remember the famous, "New York, Paris, Peckham" tagline on Del Boy's battered Robin Reliant van.... well ,for **Consett Ale Works**, we can now add a similar tag to our equally over-worked fleet - "Consett, Whitby, Alston, Seahouses... Palace of Westminster." An equally far- fetched claim, but in this case, accurate - for a short time at least. On the 8th of February, four casks of Consett Ale Works' **Steeltown**, headed to the big city, and the exclusive "Strangers' Bar", where MPs are known to assemble in "work-related gatherings" after a long day at the furnaces of power. It's the most exclusive of the many bars within Parliament, open only to MPs, senior civil servants, and invited guests.

It's on the bar thanks to a scheme, believed to have been instated under Harold Wilson (who had Federation Best as his recommendation), that any MP can nominate a brewery from their constituency and invite them so supply a flagship ale to appear on the bar. In 2019, **Yard Of Ale** sent their **Local Hero** and **Village Brewer** near Darlington also had the honour in 2011. It's worth noting that the bar pays the going price for the beer, does not ask for discounts, supplies casks, and pays the courier. So, unlike some notorious pub chains, the brewer doesn't lose out.

So what is the Strangers Bar like? It's customary for breweries who supply the beer to be invited down for a visit, and we did exactly that on February 23rd. Recently, however, Speaker of the House Lindsay Hoyle said this in an interview. "You're quite right, Strangers' Bar has had a bad reputation – I want it to have a better reputation. I want to make sure that we have the right standards, the right protection in there, and that it is there for social drinking, not heavy drinking."

Maybe that explains why they have such strict rules on the beer they will stock. "4.5% or less, traditional styles, brewed throughout the year, and no names that could in any way be interpreted to demonstrate political alliance or leaning"

So that's our own Red Dust out of the window! Strength (tick) traditional style (tick),

brewed every week (tick), "no names that that could in anyway be interpreted to demonstrate political alliance or leaning".... Hmm, in a constituency that was Labour from the day it was founded, and now has a Conservative MP?.... **Steeltown** it is, though some might argue that the fact Consett is no longer an actual "Steel Town" is all



down to politics.

So how did we get here?

It all started on a very wet, very windy, and very cold (typical Consett) December evening, just prior to Polling Day. Sick of hearing customers say "no politician has ever knocked on my door for a chat", I invited every candidate to come down and speak to the drinkers at the **Grey Horse**. Each potential MP got the floor for one night to speak to, and take questions from, their voters. Who says you shouldn't discuss politics over a pint?

Each night started with them pulling themselves an ale (they love a photo op!), and each night ended with me asking them if they would pledge to get Consett beer into the Parliamentary bar. Despite the fact I was obviously saying it with my tongue firmly in my cheek, every candidate enthusiastically agreed to do what they could. If I'm honest though, I wasn't holding my breath.

Richard Holden got a particularly rough time, as one might expect for a Conservative candidate in the so-called Red Wall, but he took it in good spirit. He talked passionately about his interest in pubs and beer as well as his politics, and even stayed for the quiz. In

fact, he's become something of a regular at **The "Hoss"**, **The Steel Club**, and also **The Black Lion** in Wolsingham. He also spoke regularly with publicans in the area during covid19, and campaigned for the area's pubs in debate in Commons, mentioning many by name. Safe to say, Richard Holden is a "pub person"

Along with many of our MPs. Richard has also spoken with CAMRA about its work. He brought Secretary of State for Business, Kwasi Kwarteng, to the brewery to talk to us about the challenges faced by pubs and breweries. For the record,

man himself, and took a few bottles of Consett Stout away with him. I might not agree with a lot of what his party says or most of what it has done, but Richard Holden's genuine passion for beer and pubs is refreshing to say the least.

Within about a month of him getting the nod from the people of Northwest Durham, there

was an order in place for our ale. We might not yet have the railway line that was proposed, but the beer was going to London in three months' time. An election pledge fulfilled before he even had an office or many staff. A great start!

Or so it seemed. Then came COVID and all the turmoil that went with it. Pubs had to close, and that meant the Strangers' Bar would close too. Those "work-related gatherings" had to find new venues. Our order was cancelled. Pubs reopened with strange rules, but with no outdoor areas and the vast majority of its customers working remotely, the Strangers' Bar remained closed. Time passed, and we had pretty much resigned ourselves to the

fact we were unlikely to have our moment. Let down by politicians again.....

Then it came. The call that they were back up and running and our ale would be among the first to appear. Surely two years is the longest any pub has had a "coming soon" sticker on its pump-clips! This was rapidly followed by the expected invite to London to sample the beer ourselves, and to enjoy a tour of the historic building, and perhaps even a look in on PMQ's. It's a day out we were looking forward to, even if the very next day saw the start of the **Grey Horse** Beer Festival, by far our busiest and most exhausting weekend of the year. It was quite a week for us!

I look forward to updating Whatpub with this rather unusual bar, and I was very curious as to what our politicians pay for our beer. Given the horror stories I have heard from drinkers in the capital, I was hoping they had a happy hour - not that it mattered too much, as one of the other quirks of the Strangers' Bar is that guests aren't allowed to pay for their own drinks: the MP has to pick up the bill. It was certainly a lot less than the subsequent pint in Covent Garden!


