

Out of interest, the first beer to sell out was Egyptian Cream milk stout by Nene Valley. See you next year!

On the awards front, the **Station House** in Durham has been chosen as the North East's Regional Pub of the Year, and thus goes in to the last sixteen of the overall POTY competition. See p29 for the competitors.

Those of you who score your beers—and many thanks for that— on Whatpub will have seen the warnings that it's about to change to *CAMRA experience*. In fact, beer scoring has been available through that new channel for a while, but the Whatpub system will be transferred to the new page. Don't worry, it's more user friendly and contains more facilities.

A recent poll has revealed that 61% of people believe the Government should be doing more to protect the existence of community pubs. Just 17% believe it is doing enough, a damning verdict on years of underinvestment, inconsistent support, and a lack of long-term safeguarding for this cherished institution.

CAMRA Chairman, Ash Corbett-Collins, said at the Great British Beer Festival:

"This week we're celebrating everything that's brilliant about pubs, brewing and beer. We will see every kind of brewer and representatives from across the industry all sharing their quality products and love for their craft. Yet this polling shows that Brits understand the pressures they're under. It's now or never for pubs. The Budget is the last chance to ease the pressure and give them a fighting chance. We are calling on the Government to reverse the rise in Employer National Insurance contributions, cut duty on draught beer, and make sure independent brewers can get their beers on the bar."

You can help by enjoying the great pubs and real ale that County Durham offers, and letting us know what you think.

CAMRA Durham Targets for 2025 and 2026

We at CAMRA Durham like to enjoy a pint of real ale and a chat, but there's also a campaigning side to things, so we thought we had better explain our campaigning aims for the coming year...

- Encourage younger people to attend CAMRA Durham events. We recognise
 that our membership is ageing, so we're aiming to emphasise the membership concession for 18-25 year olds (£25.50) and that there are £30 of vouchers included.
- 2. Raise the branch profile within local media by encouraging members to like, share, and comment on our social media posts, share Durham Drinker and other promotional material, and to suggest content for Durham Drinker.
- 3. Increase member engagement. We have nearly 700 members in our area, but only a couple of dozen are active. If you know a member who just needs a little encouragement to join in, give them that nudge. Spread the word about communication preferences—tick the correct boxes on your CAMRA account to ensure messages get through! There's always room for new faces amongst the active membership—check page 4 for committee vacancies. A social secretary would be nice! Also, check our online branch diary and Diary Dates in Durham Drinker (p2) for events that you'd enjoy.
- 4. Promote the availability of pins (small casks) to potential real ale outlets. Not every pub gets through enough of the real stuff to justify larger containers, so a 36 pint container would be more suitable than a 72. If you always ask for real ale, you can suggest this if it's not available.
- 5. Increase our membership. The more the merrier, and we got off to a great start with eleven recruited at the recent 43rd Durham Beer Festival.
- 6. Continue with the general promotion of real ale, and support any initiative that supports and protects our pubs and breweries.

The Independent Family Breweries of Britain

There are about twenty seven of these, some very long standing like Shepherd Neame, the nation's oldest brewery, founded in Faversham, Kent in 1698, and some not so old, like Hogs Back, founded near Farnham in Hampshire in 1992. By "independent family breweries" we mainly mean breweries with a tied estate of pubs that stock beers brewed by the brewery in question - referred to as vertical brewing. There might be twenty seven now, but fifty years ago the 1975 GBG listed seventy three. However, some of those listed are not really family-owned pub owning companies - they've hived off the brewing to other breweries e.g. Brakspear and Fuller's.

The Independent Family Brewers of Britain association, hereinafter referred to as the **IFBB** were formed in 1992 in response to a threat from the EU (remember that?) to remove all pubs from a brewery tie. On their web site they list those twenty seven breweries, some famous like Adnam's and Timothy Taylors, but some relatively obscure, and it's these less well known which I will be writing about in the next few issues of Durham Drinker.

The first is **Elgood & Sons** of Wisbech in North Cambridgeshire, in the centre of the Fens.



Founded in 1795, the brewery was one of the first purpose-built breweries outside London. The beautiful Georgian brewery lies on the river Nene, only half a mile from the town centre and is a Grade II listed building. The current family took over the brewery in 1878 and the fifth generation of the family now run it.

I visited their tiny visitors centre hoping for a look around their famous hop garden and tap room only to find it was only open on Thursdays 12-5pm. But I did manage to buy a case of four of their beers – firstly, their standard beer **Cambridge Bitter** with an ABV of 3.8% and described in GBG as tasting of fruit and malt on the nose with increasing hops and balanced malt with a dry finish.

Secondly **Black Dog Mild** at 3.4% which in 1998 was runner-up in CAMRA's *beer of the year* mild category, just behind **Moorhouse's Black Cat Mild**. Cats v Dogs! The tasting notes say it's a black-red mild with liquorice and chocolate and a dry roasted finish.

Thirdly, there's **Plum Porter** with an ABV of 4.5% is a rich dark porter with juicy plum aroma, and a sweet fruity background complements the roast malt flavours.

Last but by no means least, is **Warrior**, a traditional, if hefty, English bitter which weighs in at a mighty 5.5%. It has a fruity malty flavour, and the generous portions of Challenger, Goldings and Fuggles hops give it a well-hopped character.

The ones I missed are Cambridge Gold (3.9%) and Blackberry Porter (4.5%)

They have thirty tied pubs, mainly in Wisbech but also in Norwich, St Ives, and Peterborough. I visited about seven in and around Wisbech – but two were permanently closed, two closed on that day (Monday lunch time), and of the three that

were open none had their real ale for sale, making for a very disappointing visit to the Elgood pubs of Wisbech. A search for any of their pubs mentioned in the GBG reveals only one, The Blue Bell in Peterborough, so on this basis, I am unsure of the future of this 230 year old brewery.

the future of one of the largest regional brewers in the United Kingdom hangs in the balance. Swallow Hotels announced in September 1998 that it was going to exit brewing to concentrate on its leisure interests, and was therefore seeking to sell the two breweries which it owned: Vaux in Sunderland and Wards Sheffield.

Initial hopes of a management buyout (MBO) were high when Frank Nicholson. current managing director at Vaux headed a bid valued in the region of £65 million. This was for ALL WELCOME the purchase of both breweries, 350 tenanted pubs, as well as several other items

including the loan book for the Free Trade business. The bid was backed by a venture capital group and a large national bank. It seemed that the protracted negotiations would be successful, until the Swallow Group board announced that the bid was not acceptable and that unless serious obstacles could be overcome the breweries would be closed in July 1999

This rejection of the MBO led to the resignation of Sir Paul Nicholson from the board, and to increased local and national media interest in the story. The MBO team then tabled two further bids which were immediately dismissed by the Swallow Board. Redundancy notices were issued in early April and all discussions with the MBO team were stopped.

CAMRA has been campaigning actively to save the breweries in Sunderland and Sheffield. Vaux

and Wards each brew 6 cask ales, and closure would mean the ending of 160 years of brewing heritage on Wearside. It would also lead to the of 600 dismissal This employees. is perhaps the single most important issue facing CAMRA branches in northern England for several years, and it is vital that all members do something to save

the breweries from annihilation. We urge you to take action by writing to your local MP. Write to Sunderland Council expressing dismay at their lack of commitment to a local industry, and contact local newspapers with letters of protest. Durham CAMRA will support any bid which aims

to preserve the brewing tradition of these viable sites, and views the proposed closure as nothing less than commercial vandalism. To lose Vaux would be to wrench the heart from North-Eastern beer culture, and must be avoided.



This represents the first part of a three-round contest, but it all starts with the members, who presumably like drinking real ale. It's your chance to nominate







- Cask beer is available again at the Royal Oak, Cornsay Colliery.
- Ox Inn, Oxhill, Stanley is the latest pub to install Wainwright 'fresh ale' (keg beer dispensed by handpull), joining the Old Mill, Knitsley, Consett.
- Cask beer continues to be served at the Crow's Nest, Seaham and not fresh ale as previously reported.
- Rose Tree, Shincliffe closed for refurbishment 16 June and reopened 3
 July.
- The Victoria, the Colpitts and Ye Old Elm Tree in Durham City, the Butchers Arms in Chester-le-Street, the Grey Horse in Consett and the Three Horseshoes in Leamside all featured in the Daily Telegraph's recently published '500 Best Pubs in England'.
- The Station, Langley Moor reopened on July 15th. New tenants appear
 to be making an effort to make it a pub for the community going by its
 social media posts.
- The Peacock, Tanfield Village have after many years of service decided to close its kitchen, but the pub remains open.
- The Coalhouse micropub in Seaham closed its doors for good on 14 July.
- The Big Jug in Durham has reopened again, initially Friday to Sunday only but longer openings are intended with a food option.
- The Royal Oak, Byers Green believed to have closed again.
- The Royal George, Old Shotton is due to reopen
- Planning application submitted to convert the closed Wheatsheaf in Leadgate into a 5 bedroom dwelling house. Planning reference DM/25/01696/FPA


- The Fighting Cocks, Durham announced it will no longer open on Sundays.
- The Lambton Arms in Chester-le-Street has had a major refurbishment refresh and is now known simply as the Lambton - and is serving cask beer again.
- The Causey Arch Inn at Marley Hill is closed but will be reopening as the Roadhouse (at Beamish!) but still with no cask beer at least initially.
- The Red Lion at Plawsworth and the Travellers Rest at Witton Gilbert both welcomed new management.
- The Dunelm Ridge has been taken over by the 'Papas Group' and opened
 after a short closure but with no cask beer. There will be a further longer
 closure for rebranding later.
- The Copper Mine near Crook has retained its title of Pub of the Year in the Northern Echo competition
- The Red Alligator at South Church did try real ale but without success
- The Surtees in Crook has been bought by the tenants so is now a free house.
- Congratulations to Sarah-Jane Stobbs, who, at the end of August, celebrated twenty years at the Black Lion, Wolsingham and marked the occasion with a beer festival

National Pub Of The Year

CAMRA has revealed the sixteen regional winners in its *Pub of the Year* 2025 competition—and Durham City's **Station House** is the North East representative, maintaining an impressive run in the competition for the CAMRA Durham area. The shortlisted pubs have beaten thousands of entries to be crowned the best in their region or nation (Wales and Scotland) and will now battle it out for the chance to be named CAMRA's overall Pub of the Year. The final four pubs in the running for the overall title will be announced in October with the winner revealed in January 2026.

CAMRA is encouraging people to get out and enjoy their local or seek out any of these great pubs for a quality pint in great surroundings. Judges are looking for great atmosphere, décor, welcome, service, inclusivity, overall impression and, most importantly, quality cask beer, and real cider and perry.

The sixteen pubs have been recognised as the best of the best in the UK and their shortlisting for the competition is testament to their quality and commitment to their communities and the hospitality industry.

This year's contest comes as many pubs across the UK face their toughest year yet. They face high costs, heavy tax burdens, and crippling business rates. Pubs need sector-specific support, including the reform of the business rates system, a reduction in the draught beer and cider duty and a reduction in Employer National Insurance to help with staffing costs.

Andrea Briers, CAMRA's Pub of the Year Co-ordinator said: "It is a real pleasure to announce this year's top sixteen pubs, each of which has demonstrated exceptional quality, warmth, and dedication to their communities. These pubs are shining examples of what makes the Great British pub so special, from perfectly kept pints to a genuine welcome for all. Achieving this in the face of rising costs and other pressures is no small feat, and we want to see these pubs, and thousands of others like them, continue to thrive. That's why we're calling on the Chancellor to give pubs a fair deal in the Autumn Budget, so they can keep serving their communities for many years to come."
